- 3. John baptised people with water as a gesture to mark this change of heart. Sometimes we perform an action to symbolise our change of heart write a letter, throw away our last cigarettes, etc. Can you remember a symbolic gesture with which you marked a change of heart?

MASS TIME CHANGES: Please note that during December, evening Mass will be held only on Mondays at 5.45pm; this will be followed by Adoration until 7.00pm.

THE JESSE TREE: The Jesse Tree is the 'Family Tree' of Jesus. It represents the ancestors of Jesus and tells the history of His family. Jesse was the father of King David and St Matthew in his Gospel traces the descent of Jesus from David right down to St Joseph. The image is taken from the Prophet Isaiah (Ch 11). The passage is read on the Second Sunday of Advent which is today. 'A shoot shall sprout from the stump of Jesse and from his roots a bud shall blossom.' The roots symbolise Jesse, the father of David. Our Lady is the 'shoot' and Jesus is the 'Blossom'.

When you look at our Jesse Tree at the back of the Church, you will notice familiar symbols – the Garden of Eden symbolised by the apple in the grip of a snake; Noah's Ark; Abraham, Isaiah and Moses represented by the pair of sandals he removed when he realised that he was in God's presence; the Ten Commandments and many other symbols.
